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Cystoscopy with Bladder Biopsy


What is a cystoscopy with bladder biopsy?

Cystoscopy with bladder biopsy is a procedure to take small samples of the tissue from the inside of your bladder.

What happens during a cystoscopy with bladder biopsy done?

The doctor will insert a thin, lighted tube called a cystoscope into the urethra. They will look through the end of the cystoscope and will visualize the inside of your bladder in real time. They will then insert a small tool through the cystoscope that will grab small pieces of tissue from the bladder lining. The doctor will cauterize any areas of bleeding and then remove the cystoscope.





What can you expect after my cystoscopy with bladder biopsy?

- Hematuria (blood in the urine) this may come and go, lasting up to 1-2 weeks
- Increasing urinary urgency, frequency, and/or burning with urination
- You will be encouraged to increase your water intake
- Avoid bladder irritative beverages including carbonated drinks, regular coffee, decaffeinated coffee and acidic drinks
- The tissue samples taken will be sent to pathology to be evaluated for any potential abnormalities
 - You will be contacted, usually within 7-10 business days, with your results

When should I call the doctor after my cystoscopy with bladder biopsy?

Call your doctor if you experience:

- Temperature over 100.4 degrees
- Excessive chills
- Severe burning or pain urination
- Inability to urinate
